Common Questions About Bariatric Surgery

What is bariatric surgery?

• Bariatric surgery makes your stomach smaller so you feel full after eating less food. This can help people with obesity who have not been able to manage their weight over a long period of time.

What type of bariatric surgery does Nova Scotia Health offer?

- Nova Scotia Health offers laparoscopic sleeve gastrectomy (also called gastric sleeve resection).
 - Laparoscopic means the surgery is done using tools put through small incisions (cuts) in your abdomen (stomach area).
- We do not offer:
 - Roux-en Y gastric bypass surgery
 - Laparoscopic adjustable gastric band (LAGB) surgery (also called a stomach band or a lap band)
 - › Biliopancreatic diversion
 - › Duodenal switch
 - Endoscopic sleeve gastroplasty (ESG)

How does a sleeve gastrectomy work?

- A sleeve gastrectomy removes 80% of your stomach. Your stomach will then be shaped like a shirt sleeve.
- Since your stomach is smaller:
 - You will feel full after eating less food.
 - Many of the hormones which stimulate (increase) hunger will have been removed. You will have less cravings and feel less hungry.
- You will still need to eat healthy foods, be physically active, and change your behaviour. You will also need medical follow-up for the rest of your life.

Can a sleeve gastrectomy be reversed?

No.

Is bariatric surgery right for me?

Bariatric surgery may be right for you if you:

- > Are between 17 and 65 years old
- Have a BMI between 40 and 60
- > Have a BMI over 35 and a chronic (ongoing) disease, like:
 - High blood pressure

> Type 2 diabetes

> High cholesterol

Fatty liver disease

> Heart disease

Sleep apnea

- > Have a history of obesity over a long period of time
- > Have cardiomyopathy related to high blood pressure or obesity
- Have abnormal glucose tolerance or type 2 diabetes
- > Have severe (very bad) sleep apnea
- Have disabling arthritis, chronic low back pain, or osteoarthritis, or you are waiting for knee or hip replacement surgery
- Have skin breakdown caused by too much abdominal (stomach area) skin with ongoing cellulitis (bacterial skin infection) or abscesses (sores) that keep coming back
- Have metabolic dysfunction-associated steatotic liver disease (MASLD), steatohepatitis, or cirrhosis
- › Have hyperlipidemia

If I have had bariatric surgery in the past, can I have it again?

• No. We do not treat people who have had bariatric surgery in the past.

Do you offer programs for people with obesity who do not want or are not suited for bariatric surgery?

• No. Ask your primary health care provider (family doctor or nurse practitioner) to refer you to the Obesity Care Clinic in Cape Breton:

Is there a cost?

• No. If you and the bariatric surgery team decide that bariatric surgery is right for you, the surgery is paid for by the provincial health insurance plan (MSI).

If I pay, can I have surgery sooner?

• No. Bariatric surgery at Nova Scotia Health is paid for by the government. You cannot pay for it privately.

How do I get referred for bariatric surgery?

- Ask your primary health care provider about referring you.

How will I know if my referral has been sent?

- Ask your primary health care provider if the referral has been sent.
- Please do not call the clinic.

How long will I have to wait for surgery?

- You will have an intake appointment with the bariatric surgery team when:
 - you have finished the Bariatric Surgery eLearning Program.
 - > your primary health care provider decides you are ready.
- People are **not** seen sooner based on medical need.

Who is on the bariatric surgery team?

- The team includes:
 - A dietitian

An endocrinologist

A nurse practitioner

Surgeons

Will I have to change my eating after surgery?

What if I have an emergency after my surgery?

- Go to the nearest Emergency Department or call 911 right away if you have any of these symptoms:
 - > Severe abdominal (stomach area) pain
 - > Dehydration (not getting enough fluids)
 - A lot of vomiting (throwing up)

What if I have bariatric surgery outside of Nova Scotia or Canada?

- We are not able to care for people not enrolled in our program. Arrange for follow-up care from the surgery team who performed your surgery, your primary health care provider, or VirtualCareNS:
