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After Hand Surgery

My surgery is called:

Pain
You may be given a prescription for pain pills. You can also try Tylenol® Extra Strength or an anti-inflammatory (ibuprofen, Advil®, Motrin®).
Do not drink alcohol while taking pain pills.
Activity
☐ Keep your hand elevated (raised up) above the level of your heart. Do this for at least 48 hours after surgery. This will lower the amount of swelling and should lessen your pain.
☐ Keep your splint dry. If it gets wet, it will fall apart. A tub bath with your hand out of th water is safer than a shower. If you do shower, cover the dressing with a garbage bag held on with rubber bands.
 If your splint gets soft, it should be replaced. If this happens, call the Plastic Surgery Clinic at 902-473-7518 and ask for the next available appointment, or call your surgeon's office.
☐ Do not remove your splint until you talk about it with your surgeon.
☐ Do not try to move your fingers that are in the splint. Try to keep them totally relaxed. Moving your fingers may tear the repair that has been done before it can heal.
\square You may move your fingers in the splint as you feel comfortable to do so.
Dressing
☐ Leave in place until your next doctor's visit.
☐ Remove after days, and leave dressing off.
Stitches
Your stitches can be removed after days:
☐ By your family doctor or at a walk-in clinic.
☐ By your surgeon.
If you have Steri-Strips™ (thin strips of tape) over your incision (cut), they should stay in place for 7-10 days. You may cover them with a Band-Aid® so your incision doesn't rub on your clothing if you find this more comfortable. Steri-Strips™ will fall off on their own.

Things to watch for

Bleeding:

- > apply firm pressure for 10-15 minutes
- > raise your hand up above the level of your heart

Contact your surgeon's office if bleeding continues. If you have severe bleeding, go to the nearest Emergency Department.

Signs of possible infection:

- > fever or chills
- drainage from the incision that smells bad or is not clear
- redness around the incision
- pain that gets worse over time

Signs of blood flow problems:

- > numbness, tingling, or "pins and needles" feeling in hand/arm
- > unusual colour (such as white, blue, or purple) in fingers of operated hand
- pain not helped by medication

If you are worried that you may have an infection, blood flow problems, or another urgent problem, follow these steps until you are able to get help:			
1. Call your surgeon's office during regular hours.
