Care After Your Carpal Tunnel Surgery

Dr. Pickett



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- After hand surgery, keep your hand elevated (raised up) on your opposite shoulder for 24 to 48 hours (1 to 2 days) to lower pain and swelling. Keep moving your fingers.
- Do not use a sling.
- Keep the dressing on and dry for 3 days, then then take off the dressing and wash your hand gently.
- Buy a small tube of Polysporin[®] ointment (not cream) at a drugstore. You do not need a prescription. Apply the ointment to the suture line (stitches) one or 2 times a day then cover the incision (cut) with a bandage. Change the bandage as needed.
- After your sutures are removed, massage your scar one or 2 times a day. This will help to soften the scar tissue.
- You will have a follow-up appointment in about 6 weeks. Dr. Pickett's office will notify you of the date and time.
- You may feel some discomfort when the freezing wears off. Usually acetaminophen (Tylenol[®]) or ibuprofen (Advil[®]) will help.

Problems

- If there is bleeding through the bandage, apply firm, constant pressure with your hand until the bleeding stops.
- If the surgical site becomes red, swollen, and tender, it may be infected. If the problem does not go away or gets worse, call your primary health care provider or Dr. Pickett, or go to the nearest Emergency Department right away.
