What is a Newcomer Primary Care Clinic?

Nova Scotia Health and Cape Breton University have partnered to create a primary health care clinic for newcomers in the Cape Breton Regional Municipality (CBRM). The clinic will provide timely access to safe and culturally sensitive care for those without a permanent primary care provider (physician or nurse practitioner).



By Referral Only

To book an appointment, a referral is required from the following partners:

- Cape Breton Island Centre for Immigration
- YREACH Settlement Services YMCA
- Cape Breton Victoria Regional Centre for Education
- Nova Scotia Health programs and services (Public Health, Emergency Departments, Urgent Treatment Centres, etc.)

To obtain a referral, please reach out directly to these community partners. Once the clinic receives the referral, patients will be contacted with an appointment time.

Who can access the Cape Breton Newcomer Primary Care Clinic?

Residents of all ages who are:

- New to Canada within the last five years
- Living in the Cape Breton Regional Municipality
- · Without a primary care provider

NOTE: Newcomers who are CBU students, faculty and staff will continue to book appointments with Cape Breton University's Nancy Dingwall Centre for Health & Counselling clinic.
