After Your Epidural

You have had an epidural (medication in the space around your spine) for pain relief.

For 30 days (1 month) after your epidural is taken out, there is a small risk that you may develop an infection. This is very rare.

What should I watch for after going home?

- > Bad back pain that is getting worse
- > Fever (over 38° C/100.4° F)
- New numbness or weakness in your legs
- New loss of control of your bladder or bowels (peeing or pooping)

If you have any of the above symptoms, please bring this paper with you and go to the nearest Emergency Department.
