When is my appointment?

Arrive 15 minutes before your appointment to register.

If you are not able to come to your appointment, please leave a message at 902-473-1595 so another patient can be booked in your time slot.

Where do I go?

Go to the Summer Street entrance of the Halifax Infirmary (1796 Summer Street), and take the elevator to the 3rd floor. Go to the main registration desk for Diagnostic Imaging, on the 3rd floor. After you register, you will go to Nuclear Medicine just down the hall.

How long will the test take?

The test will take about 5-6 hours. You will have to wait between different parts of the test.

Getting ready for the test

- It is **very important** that you tell us if you:
 - › may be pregnant
 - › are breastfeeding
 - › have had any recent nuclear medicine studies
- Do not have any caffeine (such as tea, coffee, cola soft drinks, or chocolate) or decaf drinks for 12 hours before the test. Water, milk, and juice are fine. Don't drink any tea or coffee even if it has had the caffeine taken out.
- Bring all of your medications or a list of your medications to the hospital with you.
- Take your medications as usual unless told otherwise by your doctor.

What to wear and bring

- Wear warm comfortable clothing without buttons or zippers.
- Wear footwear that is easy to get on and off.
- Leave all jewelry at home.
- Empty your pockets.
- Bring a warm sweater without buttons or zippers in case it is cold.

How is the test done?

- A Nuclear Medicine technologist will explain the test to you and set up an intravenous (IV) in a vein in your arm.
- A radioactive isotope called sestamibi will be injected into the IV. The amount of radiation is very small and will not hurt you.
- A special gamma camera will be used to take pictures of your heart. This will take about 30 minutes.
- The technologist will tell you when to come back for your exercise test in the afternoon.

Next you will go to the Cardiac Services Department on the same floor, just down the hall from Nuclear Medicine.

- You will be asked to sign a consent form.
- A technologist will place electrodes like the ones used for an ECG (electrocardiogram) on your chest.

Remember: Do not have any caffeine while you are waiting between tests.

You will then go back to the Nuclear Medicine Department on the 3rd floor.

- A technologist will attach the electrodes to a machine which lets us watch your heart's rhythm during the test.
- A technologist and a doctor will be with you during the test.
- The doctor will give you a medication called Persantine® (dipyridamole) over 4 minutes through your IV. This will increase the blood flow to your heart the same way exercise would.
- Four minutes after this injection, you will be given another injection of sestamibi through your IV.
- Your blood pressure will be checked before, during, and after the test.
- We will tell you what time to come back for your last set of pictures.

Do not leave the hospital until you are sure that your test has been completed and the technologist says it is OK to leave.

Please talk with your doctor or technologist if you have any questions or concerns. We are here to help you.

Tell the doctor if you feel:

- › chest discomfort
- › jaw and/or arm pain
- › sick to your stomach
- › dizzy
- › short of breath

We will give you a medication called aminophylline to help with these symptoms if they are very bad.

When will I get the test results?

Your family health care provider will get the test results in a few days. They will talk about the results with you.
